





Turning Trash to Treasure



AUTISM SURVEY

The local Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs) have been awarded funding to test a Community Keyworking programme for children and young people who are autistic, have a learning disability or both. The CCGs are keen that the support offered reflects the needs of these children, young people and families. They are asking you about the type of support these children and young people would like and need from a Keyworker. SCVYS is working with the local CCGs to understand how a new Keyworker role can sup port children and young people who are autistic, have a learning disability or both.

They are offering a short online survey which should take no longer than 15-20 minutes to complete, or the option to be interviewed either over the phone or on video call to listen to their views and needs.

The survey is live and they will be able to offer phone and video interviews until Sunday 18 April 2021.
